A reformed sword practitioner cannot fight like one if he does not use the bounty of Earth to use as a focus of his power and to use its inherent material properties

to defeat his foes."

"Yes, but that is not a complete answer, Earth stands for so much more. It can signify the personal shield generators that we are both wearing to protect us from attacks. It can represent the suits of combat armor that we use to protect ourselves from damage and environmental hazards. In a more extreme case, it can even represent a Carmine mech and the mech sword in its loadout!"

That sounded like an ambitious definition!

"Does that mean that Carmine mechs have a place in your new model of

swordsmanship?"

The swordmaster's confidence sapped a little. "To be honest, I am not sure. This is one of

the unproven assumptions I devised. Let us leave this aside for the time being and move to the third variable, which is Man. This variable represents the self, the human who is shaped by both Heaven and Earth. A reformed sword practitioner may lose access to both of these variables for whatever reason, but they can never let go of Man because that represents the foundation of their existence. If Heaven is the rim of a

wheel while Earth stands for its spokes, then Man serves as the axle in the center."

"So reformed swordsmanship is a wheel that consists of three essential components. How does that benefit your sword practice?"

that their progress has slowed to the point they can never make a breakthrough in their lifetimes. This aptly describes the situation of most swordmasters, both the majority who reside in the old galaxy and the minority who reside in the Red Ocean"

"What about the less optimistic cases?"

Ketis grimaced. "Their wheels are so flawed that they either collapse or are unable to

make progress no matter how long they can live. I count the Heavensword Saints of the past and present among them. Due to inheriting the grand work, their Heaven score has improved while their Earth score has skyrocketed. However, the reason why they have doomed their futures is because their Man score has plunged to the bottom. When the axle of a wheel has broken, the entire foundation has turned hollow, I always understood this on an instinctual level, but now that I have formed a proper theory, I can finally present a logical argument."

Their willpower is probably top-notch, but willpower cultivation alone is not enough for them to break through. The swordmasters of the old galaxy are hindered by the deprivation of the power of heaven. This has also made it so that most of the swordmasters in the new frontier are still not used to leveraging E energy radiation." Ketis nodded in agreement. "The way you scored typical swordmasters is close to my own interpretation. You are right that we are still new to mastering the potential of Heaven. You are also correct that swordmasters have impressive willpower that it has formed a source of extraordinary power by itself. As for Earth... no swordmaster has developed the proper techniques to tap into the power of their equipment. That is partially because no one has

been able to forge a proper sword artifact in the past. The swords wielded by the Heavensworders are excellent products of modern engineering, but they lack the qualities that can turn them into full artifacts."

"What distinguishes a regular material sword from a sword artifact?" Ves asked an important question.

The female swordmaster replied by taking hold of the floating Bloodsinger and partially drawing out its remarkable blade.

"As you know, my Bloodsinger started out as a normal CFA-issued weapon all the way back when we entered the Starlight Megalodon."

Your weapon has especially benefited from long-term exposure to Sharpie's willpower baptism."

the value of nurturing my Bloodsinger. However, I cannot consider my efforts in doing so a qualified success. My Earth score should therefore be rather low, just like all of the other swordmasters who have carried their weapons by their side for many decades. Almost every swordmaster does it, but I find it incredibly absurd that no one has truly made an effort to explain why this is beneficial and why their current methods failed to make a meaningful difference"

As long as the pact has developed to a point, it should theoretically be possible to split the sword pieces and turn them into 'children' that are still somewhat connected to the sword practitioner. They can subsequently be reformed into full swords. If this works as well as I hope, then the loss of a 'child sword' will only set the sword practitioner back on a temporary basis."

The idea sounded rather similar to the premise behind the Fey Fianna, but the details were naturally different. Ketis relied too much on her assumptions and not enough on actual proof for this particular idea.

"The Spirit Sword Pact sounds interesting."

"This is another idea that is based on your work, Ves. The idea is to form a pact with a companion spirit that is shaped into a sword. As long as the conditions are right, the sword practitioner has successfully acquired a 'spirit sword. The two are much more tightly bound together, and shouldn't have any compatibility problems. "Just as you believe that mech pilots can become stronger by pursuing qi cultivation, I think that there is room in our society for swordsmen who forgo the development of Man because of an inability to transform their willpower and go all-out in developing their attainments in Heaven and

Earth."

That was an interesting proposal. Ves paused in thought.

"That might work, but... they will have to do much better in these areas than typical swordmasters. Willpower makes it so much easier to amplify the performance of gear, and also allows you to harness E energy radiation by force, thereby forgoing the need to understand an E energy attribute to a deep extent. However... the advantages are also clear. It is much easier to keep track of your progress in these areas. Qi cultivation is usually split up into well-organized phases, while the performance of your gear can be measured with objective criteria,"

"I think I know now why those who have reached the first major cultivation rank are called foundation builders." Ketis said. "It is because they are literally engaged in the process of building the foundation of their future domain and ultimately their godhood. At this stage, they still have the ability to change or tweak their development. Once their foundations are strong enough, they can finally welcome the birth of a domain that is based on the choices they made."

Her words rang with universal truth. Her description applied to way more cultivators than swordmasters.

Whether it was expert pilots or Senior Mech Designers, all of them were still foundation

builders!

Kingdoms.

Master Mech Designers successfully realized their design philosophies and managed to

He cares more about completing his shift so that he can go home and spend time with Kirian and Mayra"

"Are you suggesting that Joshua is failing to temper his willpower because he cares too much about his children?"

The female mech designer shook her head. "Not necessarily. Tusa is a father to children as well, but he comes across as a pilot who treats his career as the center of his life. There should be a way to balance between the two. Joshua isn't able to neglect or set aside his children as easily as Tusa. The

latter has been traveling from warzone to warzone, leaving the responsibility of raising Doria and Giovanni to Ranya Wodin-Larkinson. He may not be the ideal father, but he is most definitely a qualified

saint."

Parenthood was a huge burden to people. It was also a source of great fulfillment.

"So being a father is not necessarily bad for expert pilots, but it presents another challenge to them." Ves analyzed. "Saint Tusa did not let his parenthood interfere too much with his career, but Venerable Joshua is clearly not able to do that. While he is probably a good parent, that doesn't necessarily make for a great champion."

This was one way to interpret this situation. Ves wanted to argue that parenthood did not affect one's career in a negative manner, but that was clearly not the case. Many professionals had to balance out their work with their personal lives. Her willpower is most certainly not weak. Her Man score should definitely be high." Ketis analyzed. "She has just received the Amaranto Mark III, which means her Earth score has also shot up. Given that she has yet to break through, she either needs a breakthrough opportunity in combat where her Man score temporarily peaks above her normal level, or she needs to work on her Heaven score."

Ves was less familiar with Venerable Stark than Ketis due to his departure from the expeditionary fleet, but he still possessed a decent understanding of her progress over the past few years.

"Stark comes across as a materialistic individual to me." He said. "She doesn't invest much attention into the more magical and metaphysical stuff around her. That should put him in the best position to trigger a breakthrough opportunity."

While the pair of mech designers did not understand the full details of every expert pilot, they soon realized that the common shortcoming of most of them was their underutilization of E energy radiation.

This was still a fairly new phenomenon to red humanity, so it was not a surprise that expert pilots had yet to realize its value and potential.

Therefore, Ves became increasingly more determined to summon the champions of the Larkinson Clan to a mandatory meeting and give them a crash course on the importance of developing their affinities towards an element or concept.

"The RA and RC may know a thing or two about this as well." Ketis guessed. "Perhaps it will not be long before they publish similar instructions."

The water attribute can also strengthen a transphasic weapon's ability to overpower transphasic defenses. This is vital to defeating the well-shielded warships of the native aliens."

Ves began to smirk. "Have you noticed a common flaw in both of your descriptions? What you have said is all true. Your descriptions accurately capture the common viewpoints of almost every mech designer in the Red Ocean. That means that they all happen to make the same mistake. Ketis thought about it and frowned. In the main universe, she had just released the Stormblade Samurai Mark II. She could have used this latest insight to tweak the design of her work and help her future customers learn how to harness the power of electricity

over time.

"The Mental Simulation Training System."

Ves grinned. "Exactly. Every living mech has at least limited access to the MSTS depending on their pricing and whether they are training mechs. It has always received good evaluations from our customers, and it has always remained fairly popular. Many companies have begun to implement a lot of improvements to their own simulation programs, but their technological calculations cannot fully imitate the mental influence exerted by different E energy attributes. The MSTS also remains

the only simulation program that can fully channel the living personalities of my products. That alone ensures that it will remain the most favored solution for simulation training to our customers."

mech community.

"If the instruction granted by the MSTS is effective enough, then this could be a gamechanger." She said. "Mech pilots may spend less time on polishing their technical piloting skills, but exploring the elements and increasing their affinities to them is a different benefit. It will not help them all that much if they have not yet broken through, but the value in raising their Heaven score lies in improving their breakthrough chances. If you can statistically prove that your customers are able to advance to the rank of expert candidate and expert pilots at least 10 percent more frequently than the rest, then people will flock to living mechs just to benefit from this new function!"

Once Ves laid out the blueprint of his new plan, his former student easily agreed to his proposals.

"This is a big expansion of the MSTS." She said. "You're not just introducing ways to allow mech pilots to harness the power of E energy. You are also giving them opportunities to fight alongside each other or against each other, just like a virtual reality game." "That is exactly what I had in mind for this major update. The Elemental Universe needs to hold much greater attraction in order to lure mech pilots into using it to its full potential. If other companies think they can get by without innovating their existing products, then they deserve to get driven out of business. We aren't even professionals in this area. It is very

much possible for the established simulation companies to develop superior solutions based on more advanced and creative

applications of E energy. They just need to expand their E-technology capabilities."

That was difficult because there were far too few people who had managed to make attainments in this new but promising field.

In any case, Ves quickly began to explain how he intended to organized the Elemental

Universe.

"Every mech pilot that enters the Elemental Universe will initially emerge in their Personal Habitat. Ves said as he projected a sketch of such a space. "The most basic form is a small apartment that is attached to a small hangar that hosts their living mech. People can invite others connected to the Elemental Universe into their Personal Habitat. They can also spend FC to decorate their personal space and add new rooms."

"EC?"

"What are EC based on, Ves? Do mech pilots have to exchange them for MTA credits?" "No. That doesn't make much sense. Usually, just piloting their machines in reality is enough for them to earn a trickle of EC over the course of a day or week," "Why go through the trouble of implementing this new currency?" called this way. I want mech pilots to treat it as an alternate reality where they can live a second life of sorts. Any gains they make in the Elemental Universe will end up profiting them in the real universe. The use of currencies can reinforce this perspective shift. We need to employ a more quantitative and flexible means of controlling the energy balance of the Elemental Universe. By setting different prices on different services, we can ensure that we can maintain a positive energy balance and prevent it from draining

Vulcan."

The MSTS was currently supported by Vulcan, which was the most suitable design spirit to undertake this demanding task.

Even so, Vulcan could not bear the strain of simulating the battles of so many mech

pilots at once, so access to the MSTS's realistic simulation battles had to be limited one way or another.

Ketis understood these conditions well enough, so she did not object to the introduction of Elemental Credits. She could see numerous advantages to adopting it as the currency of the Elemental Universe.

"Since you place so much importance in this virtual currency, you are probably thinking about hoodwinking mech pilots into spending it on less energy intensive options." "Hahaha!" Ves laughed. "That's right! You know me too well. In fact, one of the new facilities that I intend to introduce is the Living City. It's a virtual urban environment

that can accommodate many mech pilots at the same time. They can relax, relieve their stress, visit coffee shops and buy fake clothes to dress up their fake avatars. The Living City will have its own economy, one that is dominated by the handicrafts made by Vulcan as he has learned how to create a lot of exquisite stuff over the years." "Even if you designed the Living City to earn easy ECs, I can see how it can benefit a lot

of mech pilots. Many soldiers have accumulated a lot of stress after fighting in the frontlines for at least several months. They need access to a sanctuary or a place to decompress, but their options are limited when they are stuck in warzones. Being able to enter the Living City and sit around in a park or a cozy cafe can help them adjust their

mentality"

"I haven't thought about that." Ves admitted. "You are right. The Living City holds even

greater value if it can help mech pilots in this manner. The current iteration of the MSTS does not offer any sort of opportunity for relaxation. This is a grave oversight that we can correct by working on the Elemental Universe."

The Living City could represent so much more. The greater it simulated the operation of a real city, the more mech pilots could inhabit it as their second homes!

His plan to create a Personal Habitat and Living City for the Elemental Universe could not be completed in a short amount of time.

Ves and Ketis had better things to do with their time than to design an entire virtual city. It was better to wait until they completed their marathon and exited the System Space before dumping this responsibility onto Vulcan and other workers.

"How will you arrange the training sections of the Elemental Universe?" Ketis asked.

"I intend to divide them into 4 discrete facilities." Ves answered. "The Mech Pilot Training Grounds will serve as a place for mech pilots to train specific skills under optimized training conditions. For example, there will be a targeting range for ranged mech pilots, and there will be a simulated swordsman mech for melee mech pilots. I could use your help to program the latter. It is best if you can divide its combat prowess into multiple levels so that everyone can experience a suitable challenge."

"No problem. This is one of my strengths. Will you charge EC to make use of these virtual training grounds?"

"Most of these training sessions will cost EC in order to access, but not too much. The training facilities are fairly small and limited in scope, so they do not cost too much energy to run."

"What is next?"

"The Cultivation Grounds are the entire purpose of renaming the MSTS into the Elemental Universe." Ves replied. "I will come up with many different training rooms where mech pilots can experience an E energy attribute and either meditate on it or whatever. I may even devise a few more interesting training exercises that can help

people increase their comprehension of different concepts or elements. Every training opportunity will cost EC. I do not want mech pilots to look down on this facility, or devalue it in their minds. Only when stuff is costly will people learn to appreciate its value."

"What can also happen is that people will think that you are doing them a disservice by overcharging for your services."

Ves shrugged. That will undoubtedly happen, but as long as no better alternatives were available, then he would rather overcharge than do the opposite.

"Do you even know how to design the Cultivation Grounds so that it can provide focused training environments that are conducive to promoting the affinities of mech pilots?" "Not completely, Ketis. My comprehension of the earth element is too low to construct such a training environment. That is what design spirits are for. I will design a few basic training grounds myself, but I will leave the ones that I am not able to develop myself to external helpers. If nothing else, I will use my connections with the Red Collective to convince their cultivation experts to assist with the designs."

That sounded like a decent plan, though it will take more time to make the arrangements and wait for the third-party developers to complete their work.

"Aside from that, what else do you intend to create?"

"The Trial Grounds will encompass much of the current training scenarios. It will offer individual mech pilots or a small team of mech pilots the ability to pay EC to enter into simulated training sessions where they can fight against virtual mechs, virtual phasefighters or virtual alien battleships."

Ketis grew a little more interested. "Will you attempt to simulate a phase lord as well? It would do mech pilots a lot of good if they can get used to confronting phase lords on the battlefield in advance."

That caused Ves to look a little more uncertain.

"I can't deny the benefits of doing so, but I fear that I will do a bad job at this. Sure, I may be a phase lord myself, but I am very different from the more developed and battle-hardened ones that appear on the battlefield. I think I will probably have to approach the Phase Lord Department of the Red Collective to enlist the aid of experts to accurately portray dozens of powerful phase lords and maybe even phase whales. The Elemental Universe will also charge a hefty amount of EC just to be able to confront such a powerful opponent once. It will be difficult for Vulcan to accurately simulate their auras, their spatial abilities and more."

Standard mech pilots were not supposed to fight against phase lords in the first place. Their mechs were simply too weak to pose serious threat to these alien monstrosities. At most, they could rely on massed firepower to deter the phase lords from persisting in their attacks.

Capturing or killing them was out of the question.

Oh well. Perhaps mech pilots might be able to keep their morale up whenever they fought in a battle where phase lords were close enough to intimidate entire mech

armics.

"What about the multiplayer features that you talked about earlier?"

"I intend to create the Combat Dispatch Center to accommodate the mech pilots who want to satisfy that specific need. This is where large groups of mech pilots can sign up for big simulated matches that pit them against each other. This facility is not meant to help mech pilots devise specific tactics and solutions against native aliens. It instead serves to temper the courage, refine the application of combat skills and increase the overall combat experience of our customers. Mech on mech combat

involving actual human pilots on both sides is a homage to the Age of Mechs. I think it will do these mech pilots a lot of good if they can compare their skills against each other."

Ketis saw another benefit to the Combat Dispatch Center despite the fact that it had nothing to do with the aliens.

"Mech pilots are highly competitive. They want to be the best. At the very least, they want to outperform their direct peers. Giving them a venue where they can enter into simulated battles against similar mech pilots who also make use of living mechs is a great way to stoke their competitive streak. Those who lost against an identical mech to their own will work harder in order to produce a better outcome next time. Those who won will not only boost their confidence, but also gain more fame and other benefits." Virtual reality mech simulation games also created a competitive dynamic between players. The companies who developed these games knew exactly how to profit from the customers who wanted to defeat their opponents in the virtual arenas of battlegrounds. Ves summed up his overall setup for the Elemental Universe.

"In short, my new vision for the future of the MSTS is a comprehensive virtual training and relaxation destination where every customer can participate in activities to raise their Heaven and Man scores. Mech pilots have a good amount of agency in doing both. They merely need additional guidance and training venues in order to improve in a targeted and more effective manner."

The only factor that most mech pilots could not improve on their own initiative was

their Earth score.

The Elemental Universe may be able to improve the growth and development of living mechs, but it could not apply any material upgrades to their designs.

This could only be done by the party who owned or fielded the LMC products.

While Ves found it regretful that the Elemental Universe was not complete enough to address this need, the current plan was already comprehensive enough to help mech pilots a lot more than before.

The Cultivation Grounds should help his existing customers gain a much better connection to the five classical elements as well as various other attributes.

This should remain the case even if they were already practicing auxiliary qi cultivation

methods.

The two could even be combined to produce a compound effect that would allow them

to gain better results!

The only price that mech pilots needed to pay was to continue to make use of living mechs and to exchange their spiritual feedback with Elemental Credits.

"The blueprint that you have created for the Elemental Universe sounds attractive." Ketis commented. "I have a feeling that many mech pilots will soon grow frustrated by how much everything costs. What you have described is not cheap in terms of energy consumption. If the only way you can support all of these activities is by fueling it with the spiritual feedback of your customers, then most of them will probably be able to partake in a few activities a week or less."

Ves sighed. "It can't be helped. I need to make the Elemental Universe attractive enough

to increase its usage rate. This statistic a bit too low for my liking at the moment, so I really need to bring out the big guns in order to lure more customers into using the evolved version of the MSTS on a regular basis."

He actually gained inspiration for this idea from learning about the mysterious prison that sustained the Nyxian Gap.

The Elemental Universe was a partial recreation of the mysterious prison.

Of course, instead of capturing unwilling souls and forcibly squeezing them in order to produce spiritual energy across eons, Ves merely wanted to earn spiritual feedback from his customers through honest work.

While he could not guarantee that he could retain enough customers in the long-term,

he did not mind it because he felt confident enough in his work to continue to bring them back again and again.

In other words, as long as Ves continued to do his job as a mech designer, he should

never be afraid that the Elemental Universe would cease to maintain a positive energy

balance!

Vulcan might even be able to reinvest the surplus income into accelerating his own personal growth and development!

The Elemental Universe had the potential to become a huge phenomena. Red humanity

may be able to derive so many benefits from it that it could become a public service that was almost as helpful to all of his customers as the Red Kingdom!

Of course, the gap between the two was far too great at the moment. Ves did not hold

any unrealistic expectations in the short term, but who knew what might happen in the long term.

If Ves wanted to, he could come up with additional energy income sources for Vulcan. He refrained from exploring them further. Each of them introduced additional risk factors, thereby increasing the possibility that his external incarnation could become

compromised.

The additional functions of the Elemental Universe would also impose a much greater burden on the design spirit. Just maintaining the Elemental City that could potentially accommodate millions of mech pilots was a heavy burden that would persistently prevent Vulcan from spending his energy on other activities.

Ves still remained committed to it, though. Mech pilots did not just pay for accessing the

Elemental Universe with their spiritual feedback.

They also paid with their information.

Vulcan would be able to grasp their piloting skills, their interpretation of different E

energy attributes and more.

This would subsequently allow him to enrich his understanding and apply his newfound gains onto his increasing number of artifacts!

Chapter 6610 Shifting Priorities

The Mental Simulation Training System or MSTS would soon become a thing of the past. Ves planned to transform it into the Elemental Universe, which incorporated all of the functions of the MSTS but vastly expanded it into a separate reality.

In the Elemental Universe, the users of LMC products would be able to enter a community of likeminded mech pilots and partake in one of the many services that Ves planned to introduce.

If not for the fact that mech pilots needed to 'earn' Elemental Credits through regularly piloting their living mechs, the Elemental Universe might actually be able to consume their lives to the point of living permanently in their cockpits!

It was just as well that the Elemental Universe possessed this inherent usage restriction. The purpose of making it available to mech pilots was to strengthen them and help them prepare for the very real threats bearing down on red humanity.

His Heart of Steel had matured to a significant enough extent that he had already developed a domain and gained a few notable traits that surpassed the mundane.

However, despite practising an advanced combination of creation cultivation, deity cultivation, artifact cultivation and qi cultivation at the same time, Vulcan mostly saw himself as a divine artisan.

His domain reflected this as it mainly strengthened metal, granted strong mental and spiritual resistance at the cost of dampening emotions, empowered dwarves and

increased the productivity as well as the creativity of craftsmen.

There was no explicit combat focus to Vulcan's power development.

The only defensive boost was solely designed to guard against the unwelcome mental contamination from the Iron Resonant Crucifix Crown, and the design spirit wouldn't be completely safe from this threat until he had reached the 7th stage of his cultivation method.

The Iron Resonant Crucifix Crown may satisfy his energy demands, but it did not enrich his knowledge and understanding of products.

This was a nearly impossible task for any but the best artisans in the Red Ocean. Perhaps Vulcan might be able to polish his skills through persistent practice and study over the span of several hundred or thousand years, but the God of Dwarves, Mechs and Craftsmanship did not have the luxury of time!

He had no choice but to resort to shortcuts if he wanted to break through in a hurry. However, unlike Gaia whose foundation was extremely feeble shortly after her birth and immediate ascension into godhood, Vulcan's cultivation was a lot more solid and systematic.

His foundation had already become extremely solid, and his domain was gaining more and more resilience with each passing day.

If not for siphoning so much juice out of the symbol of authority, it would have literally taken hundreds of years or more of steady practice in a medium-energy environment to achieve similar results!

All of this sounded great, but the gap between his energy state and his craftsmanship attainments was constantly growing wider.

It couldn't be helped. The deity cultivation aspect of the Metal God Method was meant to help him develop his craftsmanship through receiving the spiritual feedback of many worshipers, but this method had very clear limitations.

First, there weren't a lot of pure craftsmen out there. The population of red humanity was just a fraction of the population of original humanity.

Artisans who mainly relied on superior craftsmanship to create quality products and sell them at enormous premiums also constituted a tiny minority of the total industrial

sector.

Most products used by people in modern times consisted of mass produced factory goods!

The developments of the Red War also made the situation worse.

The demand for consumer goods, especially handmade luxury goods such as designer bags, had plummeted in the past year.

As the wartime economy steadily ramped up, more resources and attention shifted to military industries.

The civilian economy suffered in every way, especially after states instituted martial law in order to force their citizens to change their spending behavior.

One of the obvious consequences of this industrial upheaval was the shuttering of a lot

of workshops.

Not even brands that had occupied a niche for multiple centuries could keep their businesses running in a society increasingly beginning to deviate from the lost

prosperity of the Age of Mechs!

Perhaps the only consolation for the many craftsmen that soon found themselves out of

a steady job was that the Red Collective quickly picked them up and put them into

brand-new training programs.

The collies recognized the importance of creation cultivators.

They were the only individuals who were capable of producing artifacts, especially high-level ones that possessed traits that could never be acquired through mass

production.

Therefore, a lot of people who previously worked with metal, bone, leather or thread suddenly began to learn a lot of extraordinary methods and techniques that enabled them to imbue special qualities in their handicrafts.

The emergence of traditional craftsmanship benefited Vulcan a lot, but the problem was that most trainees still had to go through a few years of focused learning and practice before they became half-decent traditional craftsmen.

This left Vulcan with an increasing slowdown in knowledge acquisition. Setting up the Elemental Universe in the next few months should therefore compensate for this

development to an extent.

Observing how these mech pilots increased their comprehension and ability to harness various E energy attributes did not automatically mean that Vulcan could do the same.

However, just watching a lot of people increase their mastery over the classical elements and so on provided Vulcan with a lot of reference data.

This would not only help him craft better artifacts that were based on the same E energy attributes, but also help Ves develop better elemental Carmine mechs!

In short, the Elemental Universe could prove to become a vital component of Vulcan's growth as a spiritual entity.

Since the future cultivation of one of his other selves was at stake, Ves did not dare to neglect the importance of this new priority.

Ves added time slots in his schedule that were solely reserved for building up the Elemental Universe.

The time detracted from his Mission-clearing activities, but Ves had long given up on maximizing his AP income by this time.

He understood Ketis' perspective a lot better now that he was engaging in a similar

activity.

Some gains were more important than Ascension Points.

The greatest value to earning AP was to extend his stay in the System Space. While Ves still wanted to earn enough AP to upgrade the Dimension Observatory and

acquire a few juicy enlightenment fruits, it became increasingly more difficult to meet all of his goals for this marathon.

"Plans change." Ves shrugged. "I already accumulated plenty of knowledge for the time being. My demand for enlightenment fruits is not particularly great when I am not even close to fully utilizing what I have already learned."

Utilization had always been an old problem for Ves.

Access to the System had spoiled him in terms of knowledge accumulation.

While he was not as bad as the Polymath, he could not resist the opportunity to learn

and gain proficiency in exotic new fields if the opportunity presented itself. This caused his head to become increasingly more congested with information, much of which he never utilized all that much.

For example, the Introduction to the Withering Curse Enlightenment Fruit had granted him a lot of knowledge related to a curse that was based on the wood element. This opened a lot of new possibilities, but after making initial use of it, he had set it aside as his subsequent projects had very little to do with this valuable knowledge. "Perhaps it is time for me to change that." Ves murmured.

The Introduction to the Withering Curse granted him valuable insights related to his upcoming ambition to design a Woodsap mech, but that was still a distant prospect. Ves dug up one of the mech design proposals from the depths of his cranial implant. He remembered that he devised this idea in one of his daydreams.

[The Null Project]

Just as its name suggested, Ves originally came up with this idea in order to supply the

Battle Criers with a signature mech design.

The Battle Criers had become his go-to mech legion when it came to countering

spiritual shenanigans.

While the Battle Criers had lost a bit of relevance after the outbreak of the Red War, the mechs armed with the special Godkiller Heavy Luminar Crystal Rifles became

increasingly more relevant as they were quite good at draining azure energy shields.

While they were still far behind red humanity when it came to adopting systematic cultivation, the more clever phase lords already showed signs of harnessing new abilities that were traditionally associated with qi cultivation!

That would make them even deadlier than before. Phase lords already possessed

amazing physiques.

If they could amplify their strengths and mitigate their shortcomings by making use of a

completely different power system, then they would definitely pose a greater threat against all human units aside from champions!

High-ranking mech pilots would become even more important than before as their extraordinary willpower allowed them to overpower most qi cultivation techniques. "Expert pilots and ace pilots aren't always available in sufficient numbers." Ves determined. "A lot of breakthroughs have occurred in the past half year, but it takes time for them to acclimate to their new strength and obtain the right mechs that can allow

them to channel their full power!"

There were simply too many battlefields and not enough champions to cover them all.

Human High Command had already made the helpless decision to transfer a lot of second-class ace pilots to the Upper Zones in order to bet on winning the most crucial battles of the Red Tide Offensive.
