Aarav returned to wrap up the innings in style. He dismissed Green for 91, breaking through the defense of the Australian skipper with a peach of a delivery that jagged back in sharply. The crowd gave Green a standing ovation for his valiant effort, but his dismissal effectively sealed the game for India.

The final two wickets fell quickly. Shivam Mavi cleaned up Ryan Hadley with a perfect yorker, and Aarav Pathak delivered the final blow by trapping Llyod pope LBW. Australia was bowled out for 231 in the 44th over.

The Indian bowlers celebrated emphatically as the stadium erupted with joy. Aarav led the attack with a stunning 5-wicket haul, ably supported by Shivam Mavi (1 wickets) and Kartik Tyagi (2 wickets) and Ravi Bishnoi (2 wickets) and Arshdeep Economical Spell. The victory by 66 runs booked India's spot in the final, and the fans celebrated late into the night, dreaming of World Cup glory.
